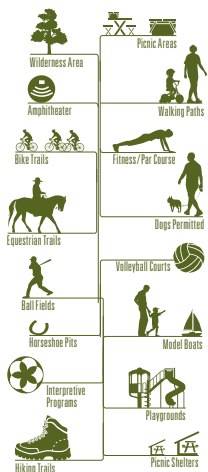

There are biking paths, model boat sailing, a wilderness hiking area, three separate toddler areas and everything else you need to escape, right here in the middle of it all.

A BRIEF HISTORY.

The land comprising Mason Regional Park was originally part of the Rancho San Joaquin, owned by José Sepúlveda. Sepúlveda received a 48,803-acre land grant from Mexican Governor Juan Alvarado in 1837 that encompassed the present day Irvine and the San Joaquin Hills, and an additional land grant in 1842 that encompassed Newport Bay southeast to what was then Laguna Canyon Creek in present day Newport Beach. He was bought out by James Irvine and partners during the Great Drought of 1865. Originally named University Park after nearby UC Irvine, the park was renamed after William R. Mason, who served as president of the Irvine Company from 1966 until his death in 1973, and who was instrumental in the donation of 345 acres of land for this park. The first phase of Mason Regional Park opened in 1973, and the second phase opened in 1978.

Mason Regional Park features several picnic shelters that you can reserve for groups, including one that can accommodate up to 500. Enjoy a nice, quiet picnic with family or friends. Or invite more people and turn it into a party. Have a family reunion. Have a class reunion. Whatever you have, you'll have fun.

FEEL FREE TO EXPLORE.

Mason Regional Park features a 123-acre wilderness area. You can easily explore it on the 3 miles of hiking/biking trails that meander through. You might see quail, rabbits and even the occasional roadrunner.
